

Going Bovine by Libba Bray



Cameron, a 16-year-old slacker whose somewhat dysfunctional family has just about given up on him, as perhaps he himself has, when his diagnosis of Creutzfeldt-Jacob, reunites them, if too late. The heart of the story, though, is a hallucinatory—or is it?—quest

with many parallels to the hopeless but inspirational efforts of Don Quixote, about whom Cameron had been reading before his illness.


You Know Where to Find Me by Rachel Cohn


We Were Here by Matt de la Peña

Fallen Angels by Walter Dean Myers



A coming of age tale for young adults set in the trenches of the Vietnam War in the late 1960s, Fallen Angels is the story of Perry, a Harlem teenager who volunteers for the service when his dream of attending college falls through. Sent to the front lines, Perry and his

platoon come face-to-face with the Vietcong and the real horror of warfare.

Punkzilla by Adam Rapp

14-year-old Jamie is AWOL from military school and on the way to visit his gay brother who is dying from cancer. Story told through letters to Peter as he hitchhikes across the country.

Sexually abused by her mother and father. forced to bear two children by her father, obese, and illiterate, Precious struggles with being a teenager. Inspired the movie "Precious."



of Baltimore's loneliest weirdos.


